#### **Current Onion Research**

USDA Specialty Crop Block Grant - Dr. Mary Hausbeck: "Leaf Blight Decreases Michigan Onion Yields and May Increase Bulb Rot: New Approaches Are Needed." This grant was for \$82,721. Field Work was completed in the summer of 2020, with more to continue in 2021.

USDA Specialty Crop Block Grant - Dr. Mary Hausbeck: "Combining Pest Control Strategies to Increase Quality of Yield of Michigan Onions." \$98,814. Grant begins in 2021 and finishes in 2023. One item this grant will investigate is whether onion thrips spread foliar diseases. Dr. Zsofia Szendrei and Dr. Ben Werling will be playing contributing roles in this project.

Michigan Onion Committee Research Grant - Dr. Sushila Chaudhari: "Weed management programs with PRE and POST herbicides in onion." \$7,500. This work will be accomplished in 2021 with perhaps some continuing into 2022. Pyroxasulfone, Tiafenacil, Florpyrauxifen-benzyl, and pyroxasulfone + flumioxazin will be evaluated. White campion is becoming a problematic weed in onions and this will be researched.

# Michigan Onion Committee - 2022 Referendum Vote

Sometime before summer 2022 MDARD and the Michigan Onion Committee will hold a vote to continue the Michigan Onion Promotion and Development Program. Michigan onion growers are allowed to cast their vote on whether the program should continue. The program has been in existence since 1977. The program assesses up to \$.06 per hundredweight of onions sold. Program funds are used for marketing and research to benefit Michigan's onion industry.
